Minimalism	Minimalism is a simple style of music which originated on the West coast of America in the 1960s with composers such as Steve Reich, Terry Riley and Philip Glass.
Ostinato	A rhythmic, melodic or harmonic pattern, which is repeated many times.

Rhythm	Patterns of short and long notes

## Features:

Minimalist music often features: •layers of ostinati

•constantly repeated patterns that are subjected to gradual changes

layered textures


•interlocking repeated phrases and rhythms

•diatonic harmony

The combined effect can be almost hypnotic.

**Diatonic** means using notes which belong to the key rather than chromatic notes, which are outside the key.

Compare and contrast with other classical pieces previously studied: Year 4 - Vivaldi, The Four Seasons and Year 5 - Holst, The Planets.



John Adams was born on the 15<sup>th</sup> February 1947 in Massachusetts, USA and began writing music when he was about 10. As a student he became fascinated with a slightly older American composer called Steve Reich and his new style of music called minimalism. It's estimated that Short Ride in a Fast Machine is performed somewhere in the world at least once every day!
