Who? What? Where?

Native American Art is all art created by the people who originally lived in North America and their descendants. This art is by people from tribes with different cultures, native languages and tribal styles.

Key facts

Native American art is the art of the *indigenous* people of North America, often called American Indians.

Many **Native American** art objects are meant to be practical as well as beautiful, for example utensils, bowls, baskets or blankets.

Native American artists focus on the process rather than the product, giving a lot of attention to interacting with the materials, which often involves certain *rituals*.

Native American cultures create art that reflects their environment, working with the natural materials of their homeland, such as wood, stone, grasses, feathers and animal hide.

Techniques used to create **Native American** art: carving, weaving, painting, pottery, basketry and metal craft.

Symbols are important in **Native American** culture; they are used to tell stories about life, the human spirit and nature. Native American artists use *symbols* to reflect their culture and their connection to the natural world.

Totem poles are created by **Native American** tribes in the north and northwest. They are carved from cedar wood and represent generations of family members or a spiritual story.
